Education for girls on the front line of conflict and development

GWI argued in favour of secondary education for girls not being a soft issue, at a panel organised by University of London School of Public Policy on 29 June 2015 in Geneva. GWI's United Nations Representative Nina Joyce stated that girls' education can spark cultural, political and economic change. "Boko Haram understands this and AI Shabab understands this. The higher education space is on the front line of tensions about which direction a society should take." she said, "In secondary education, there is also a conflict between power and ideas." The best indicator of a country's peacefulness is the well-being and education of its girls and women. Girls' education is also the cornerstone for development and employment. This has never been more true than in today's knowledge economy: for example, if India were to increase the proportion of girls in secondary school by 1%, its GDP would grow by USD 5.5bn.

GWI participate in the Human Rights Council's 29th session

The 29th session of the Human Rights Council took place on 15 June to 3 July at the United Nations in Geneva. GWI participated in this event and welcomed a focus on girls' right to education and women's rights during the session. In an opening statement, Zeid Ra'ad Al Hussein, United Nations High Commissioner for Human Rights, stressed that "women's rights should be at the heart of ours". The programme included panel discussions on "Realizing the equal enjoyment of the right to education by every girl" and an "Annual full-day discussion on the human rights of women". The panel on the right to education by every girl was organised by the United Arab Emirates and took place on 16 June 2015. The panel included Zeid Ra'ad Al Hussein, who stated that "Access to education is the key that unlocks many kinds of achievements and choices. It is a right in itself, but also a multiplier right". The Special Rapporteur on the right to education, Kishore Singh, stressed girls' fundamental inalienable right to education. An interactive dialogue took place on 18 June 2015 with Singh, on his latest report, "Protecting the right to education against commercialisation". GWI co-sponsored an oral statement submitted by the International Organization for the Right to Education and Freedom of Education (OIDEL), in support of this report.

GWI's written statement on the right to education accepted for distribution

<u>GWI submitted a written statement to the 29th session</u>. The statement entitled "Full Realisation of the Right to Education for Girls and Women" emphasised the right to education as a standalone international human right and an enabler of numerous other human rights.
