### **Graduate Women International news**

On International Day to Eliminate Violence Against Women (VAW), 25 November 2015 – Graduate Women International (GWI) calls for all relevant legislation to be fully implemented

Gender-based violence exists globally in all strata of society and disproportionally affects women and girls of all ages in many forms - physical, sexual, psychological, and economic. GWI calls for full implementation of existing legislation and the establishment of preventative interventions with the active engagement of men and boys. An environment must exist where reporting of violence attaches no stigma to the victims in order to end impunity and bring criminal justice to those who are guilty of such violations.

The colour orange represents a bright and optimistic future free of violence for women and girls everywhere, hence the <u>United Nations (UN) Secretary General's international campaign</u> call to wear orange on this day, or organise events with an orange theme: #orangetheworld. #### Netherlands member successfully advocates for ratification of Istanbul Convention

The Dutch Association of Graduate Women - Nederlandse Vereniging Van Vrouwen Met Hogere Opleiding (VVAO), along with other women's NGOs in the Netherlands, have been actively lobbying, contacting politicians and organising different types of expert meetings to influence the country's decision on the Istanbul Convention against Violence Against Women. As a result of their efforts, the <u>Istanbul Convention</u> has finally been ratified by the Netherlands. The purpose of this important European treaty is "to end all forms of violence against women, including domestic violence (of which men can be victims too)." The Netherlands are the 19th country to ratify the convention; this means the Group of Experts on Action against Violence against Women and Domestic Violence (GREVIO) of the Council of Europe now has a majority and can start working on the monitoring process of the implementation of the Istanbul Convention.

## **Advocacy**

#### Argentine men show solidarity with women in an unusual protest against gender violence

Argentina has one of the worst rates of femicide in the world. It is a problem that experts say is intertwined with a culture of "machismo" and misogyny in the country. Some reports indicate that one woman is killed

about every 30 hours in Argentina. Women have started to fight back through a campaign called #NiUnaMenos, which means "not one less." This month, in a show of solidarity with #NiUnaMenos, hundreds of men walked through the streets of Buenos Aires wearing skirts. One of the skirted protesters said that the protest was a way to teach his son about gender equality. "This march was very useful to convey to my son [...] there is no privilege in being a male," he said. He explained that he was wearing a skirt to break "some stereotypes" about what humiliates a man, which is violence, and not wearing something feminine.
