Graduate Women International (GWI) commemorates Human Rights Day, 10 December 2015

On Human Rights Day, 10 December 2015, Graduate Women International (GWI) will commemorate one of the most recognised international United Nations days, on which, in 1948, the United Nations General Assembly adopted the <u>Universal Declaration of Human Rights</u>. Enshrined within this historical document, the human right to free education for all must continue to be asserted and recognised. As a standalone right and one which enables other human rights, the right to education combines GWI's advocacy priorities reflecting the need for action in many areas that touch girls' and women's lives. During this critical year, as the <u>Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs)</u> were adopted and the world moves towards implementing measures that address global poverty and inequality, the human and educational rights of women and girls must include access to quality lifelong education and training for all women, including those most vulnerable due to conflict, disability or isolation. Finnish Federation of Graduate Women holds Annual General Meeting and elects new president

The Finnish Federation of Graduate Women (FFGW) held its Annual General Meeting (AGM) on 14 November 2015. The current President, Professor Helena Ranta, will leave her post after a full three-year term at the end of 2015. She will be succeeded by Tuija Brax, whose three-year term will commence on 1 January 2016. Tuija is a well-known politician and former Minister of Justice in Finland. She announced that she was leaving party politics in 2014 and she now works as the General Secretary of Finland's Heart Federation. Brax has a Master's degree in law from the University of Helsinki.

Advocacy

UNESCO Framework for Action 2030 Paris, 4 November 2015

The high-level Framework for Action 2030 (FFA) meeting was held in Paris on 4 November 2015, and preceded the Education Commission of the 38th UNESCO General Conference. The FFA provided guidance to countries for the implementation of the Education 2030 Agenda, towards inclusive and equitable quality education and lifelong learning for all. During the meeting, ministers and invited leaders of the World Education Forum (WEF)

2015 co-convening agencies and parties, including civil society, were asked to share their views on, and commitments to, the final FFA. This consultation was attended by GWI's Paris UNESCO representatives, who emphasised GWI's key message of empowering women and girls through quality education up to the highest levels. The FFA has been developed through a consultative process including elements agreed upon in the World Education Forum 2015 in May (Incheon, Republic of Korea). During this forum, GWI's Executive Director Danièle Castle ensured the integration of key GWI messaging into the draft declaration WEF document, highlighting gender equality and fostering the use of information and communication technology and disaggregated data collection into quality education provision.

Woman of Distinction Award now accepting nominations

Nominees for the Woman of Distinction Award (WoDA) 2015 must exhibit evidence-based leadership in their field of expertise. Nominees must be advocates for positive social change to close the leadership gap and create a more equitable society for women and girls. They must support policies, practices, attitudes, and/or actions that are intended to produce equitable outcomes for women and girls connected to the <u>Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs)</u> and <u>the Beijing Platform for Action</u>.
