GWI Hegg Hoffet Committee Highlight

The Hegg Hoffet Committee oversees the <u>Hegg Hoffet Fund for Displaced Women Graduates</u> and deals with applications for assistance from graduate women (in special cases tertiary women students) who have been displaced as a result of war or political upheaval, natural disasters, or other serious emergencies. They award short term grants for required courses for re-entry into the candidates' professional fields, retraining courses if the candidate is not able to practise her previous profession, and courses for integration into the new country of residence. They also correspond with grantees to follow their progress and offer moral support. In addition, they develop initiatives to publicize grant availability and solicit funds for future grants. The Hegg Hoffet Committee is composed of Committee Convenor Jazmeira Cabrera from the Panama Association of University Women (PAUW) and Committee Members Margaret Giles from the Australian Graduate Women Inc. (AGW) and Gomathy Venkateswar from the Indian Federation of University Women's Associations (IFUWA).

FEMU delivers proposals responding to demands of organised women to Mexican government

GWI National Federations and Associations (NFAs) around the world are taking action to promote women's voice and leadership at the highest level. Earlier this month, the Mexican Federation of University Women (FEMU) presented a proposal on how to respond to the demands of women organising for institutional change to the Mexican Secretary of the Interior Dr. Olga Sanchez. The proposals centre on reviewing the current regulatory framework, public politics and education in Mexico. Dr. Sanchez, a former judge on the Mexican Supreme Court and current member of FEMU is a prominent female political figure in the country. During the meeting with FEMU leadership and members, Dr. Sanchez stressed her commitment to equality and has instructed the Ministry of the Interior to prioritise ending violence towards women and other gender-related issues. On World Water Day, GWI calls for increased action to decrease girls' school absence

On 22 March, GWI will join the global community in observing World Water Day that was established by the United Nations (UN) in 1993. Each year international communities join together to find cooperative solutions to water scarcity. On this day, GWI will be advocating for not just the challenge water scarcity poses to populations in need, but the particular hardship it inflicts on women and girls. The theme for 2020 World Water Day connects to SDG 13, mitigating the impact of climate change, as this year's day of observance centres on the linkage between climate change and water-related issues. Globally, women

and girls bear a disproportionate amount of the burden and consequence of irregular access to clean, safe, water. Among these burdens and consequences is the time water collection takes from women and girls' education. The UN International Children's Emergency Fund (UNICEF) estimates that globally women spend 16 million hours a day collecting water. That is 16 million hours that women and girls are not in school. GWI will launch a social media campaign on 20 March addressing the negative consequences water scarcity creates for women and girls. GWI written statement to the 43rd session of the Human Rights Council (HRC43)

The GWI written statement submitted on the occasion of HRC43 was published by the UN. Through this statement, as an organisation committed to SDG 4, education for all, and to empower all women and girls through the safe access to quality education, GWI urges member states to recognise that women and girls' participation at all levels of the climate crisis solution is imperative and, in the long run, will make a positive difference. This co-sponsored fellowships programme aims to increase capacity-building and human resources development of sustainable and renewable energy sources in developing and transitioning countries. The programme offers twenty fellowships, each four weeks long, held in Moscow, Russia. All instruction will be in English. Applicants must be no more than 35 years of age, proficient in English, and have received a Bachelor's Degree in Economics. The deadline to apply is **3 April 2020**. The Fellowship funds are intended to facilitate a research project that encompasses both the nature of the currently approved PhD program and the specialised knowledge and skills of the applicant. The Fellowships are open to women who are Australian citizens or permanent residents of Australia and are enrolled in a PhD degree by research in any discipline at any Australian university or equivalent Institution. Applicants must have successfully completed at least the equivalent of the first year of their PhD program. AFGW will select two recipients for 2020. The deadline to apply is **30 April 2020**. Educated girls and women are better equipped to participate effectively in society, to protect themselves from harm and to care for their children. Children of educated women are healthier and far more likely to go

— Did you know? —

Did you know that the GWI, formerly known as the International Federation of University Women (IFUW), logo was designed by members of the Norwegian Federation in 1924? The logo was designed for the Third Conference, which took place in Oslo, Norway. The lamp became the logo for IFUW following this meeting. The original logo was an antique lamp to represent the "light of learning" with a blue background and IFUW letters. The logo also included an interlinked chain to symbolise the bonds of friendship between members. With time, the lamp placed greater meaning with friendship and became the lamp of friendship, resulting in the removal of the chain from the logo. This logo remains as the prominent image of GWI, revealing the bond between all GWI members with a common mission.
