Generation Equality Forum Postponed

The Generation Equality Forum is a global gathering for gender equality, convened by UN Women and cochaired by the governments of France and Mexico, with and the close partnership of civil society. As the situation surrounding COVID-19 evolves, the number of people around the world affected by this disease continues to increase. This global public health crisis has direct implications for the Generation Equality Forum and for gender equality and women's human rights. In response this crisis, the Generation Equality Forum will be postponed until further notice. The new dates will be announced in the coming months. In the months leading to the Generation Equality Forum, a series of virtual engagements will be organized in collaboration with partners to foster continued momentum, participation and commitment of all stakeholders. The Forum was supposed to kick-off in Mexico City, Mexico, on 7-8 May 2020 and culminate in Paris, France, on 7-10 July 2020. You can read more about the gatherings by selecting the events below. News from the Mexican Federation of University Women (FEMU) Women's Museum

In 2011, FEMU was instrumental in the creation of the Mexico City's Women's Museum (MCWM) and continues to actively contribute to the museum's work and mission. Dedicated to examining the History of Mexico using a gender studies approach, from pre-Hispanic times to the present, the museum aims to increase the visibility of women's work and contributions toward the construction of the Mexican nation. On 18 March, the MCWM, which is one of the many museums belonging to the National Autonomous University of Mexico (UNAM), was honoured to receive Dr. Guadalupe Valencia, Coordinator of Humanities at UNAM. She was welcomed by Dr. Mirella Feingold (FEMU Executive President), Dr. Nadima Simón (FEMU Honorary Adviser), and Dr. Guadalupe López Acosta (FEMU Treasurer). Dr. Valencia stressed the importance of the MCWM and the relevance it has had in making visible the role of women in Mexico's history.

COVID-19 Update from the United Nations Department of Economic and Social Affairs (UNDESA)

Even in these extraordinary times, GWI United Nations (UN) Representatives are keeping active and are continuing to represent GWI in the remote meetings and events organized by the UN. On 9 April, GWI UN Representative in New-York Maryella Hannum attended the UNDESA Webinar on the economic and social impact of COVID-19. This webinar was critical in raising awareness and sharing information on COVID-19 in three critical areas: Economic Impact; Social Impact; Financial Markets and Financing. Approximately 900 global participants were on the call. The call included topics such as a need for a measured and coordinated global response, global lock down, containment, testing, various approaches to stimulus packages, risk of debt crisis, digital divide, timing and sequence, as well as the way forward. UN High Commissioner for Human Rights "COVID is a colossal test of leadership"

On 9 April, GWI participated in the UN Human Rights Council virtual informal conversation with the UN High Commissioner for Human Rights, Michelle Bachelet, on the human rights implications of the COVID-19 pandemic. During this first ever virtual informal conversation, the High Commissioner said that, COVID "is a colossal test of leadership". She urged global unity to promote strong, multilateral, cooperative COVID-19 exit strategies to ensure that extensive economic and social measures were taken in every country to minimize the further growth of inequalities. She noted that the continued funding to civil society organizations was particularly important so they could continue their human rights-based work. She also noted that, while school closure in many countries raised concern about deepening educational inequalities, the situation also presented an opportunity to address those very inequalities and provide access to education for all children.
