GWI marks International Day against Child Labour held annually 12 June

GWI has issued a press release to mark International Day against Child Labour. The year 2021 is designated, by a United Nations General Assembly resolution, as International Year for the Elimination of Child Labour. The resolution urges governments to do what is necessary to achieve Sustainable Development Goal 8. Target 8.7 asks Member States to take immediate and effective measures to eradicate forced labour among other targets. Today, 152 million children are still in child labour according to the ILO. Child labour is a cruel atrocity robbing children of their childhoods and the world of its future. Child labour prevents girls from accessing education. GWI calls on states, organisations, and individuals to value education, both formal and informal, as a means to eliminate child labour. GWI encourages the wide sharing of its comprehensive social media campaign on Facebook, LinkedIn and Twitter aimed to raise awareness about this harmful practice.

GWI Membership Marketplace NFA-to-NFA Afghan Peace Negotiations: Their Perilous Significance for Women in Afghanistan webinar summary

GWI highlights TCAUW latest activities: conference and written statement

GWI is heartened that, despite global challenges, NFAs continue to develop impactful activities. In this regard, TCAUW recently held a Zoom conference on "Women and Laws". Presented by three activists and lawyers from Cyprus and Turkey, this event gathered around 60 women from Cyprus and other countries. Moreover, on 3 May 2021, they submitted a written statement jointly with 23 associations and organisations in the Parliament. This statement, which addresses Domestic Violence Law in Turkish Republic of Nothern Cyprus (TRNC), called the 50 members of the Parliament to "pass the Domestic Violence Law in line with international and the EU laws in order to prevent violence against women and children in our country" and pointed out that "necessary legal arrangements should be made in cooperation with non-governmental organizations (NGO's) for a more effective operation of the Women's Unit". GWI congratulates TCAUW for their extraordinary work.



The AGFDU offers free psychological counselling for women and students

The current health situation, due to the coronavirus pandemic, with its share of consequences (bereavement, confinement, concerns, isolation, loss of employment, uncertainty, teleworking, job insecurity, financial insecurity) has largely favoured the emergence of vulnerability factors within the entire population. The presence of these factors of personal and interpersonal vulnerabilities offers a favourable ground for the accentuation and/or the occurrence of psychological difficulties. We observed that women were particularly affected and made vulnerable. In view of this worrying observation for mental health, social, family, professional and academic balance, we have a thought for all women, all mothers, all girls, who are confronted on a daily basis with their own psychological difficulties, to those of the couple, to the difficulties related to the education of the children, to the



difficulties that students and girls go through during their studies, etc.

The AGFDU and the CLAFG (Connection Center of Geneva Feminine Associations) who collaborate together for well-being, integration, academic and professional success, development of women and girls, has found appropriate to provide their support in the accompaniment of women and girls who are going through psychological difficulties. This is why we provide a framework for listening, support and psychological guidance. Starting on the occasion of March 8, celebrating International Women's Rights Day, free psychological assistance will be offered to provide women and students with psychological support. This psychological assistance will take place at the CLAFG location, by an experienced psychologist in supporting women, member of the Geneva section.

World Refugee Day "Together we heal, learn and shine"

Refugees are among the most vulnerable people in the world. In fact, according to the United Nations, every minute that passes sees 20 people forced to leave everything behind to escape war, persecution or terror.

Forcibly displaced women face barriers to securing economic livelihoods, discrimination in many forms, sexual violence, limited access to service and negative consequences from some cultural practices. Refugee and migrant women and children are at particular risk for human trafficking and other abuses as a result of their vulnerable status as they are often pawns in larger political games of intractable conflict.

Children alone make up half of the "people of concern" according to the United Nations Human Right Council (UNHRC), as they are often separated from parents or traditional caregivers and even recruited to be child soldiers - both boys and girls. Obtaining any education becomes impossible.

GWI has created <u>Advocacy Campaigns</u>, containing recent facts and statistics on the impact of COVID-19, to help GWI NFAs and their members urge their respective governments to take positive actions around these issues. In addition, GWI uses its consultative role with UN Women, UN Refugee Agency, UN Human Rights Council, and other international bodies to assist in their implementation.

Plan International webinar "Time to Act – Let's Go Digital! Using digital technology to end child, early and forced marriage and reduce adolescent pregnancy in Asia-Pacific"

Asia is once again under a new or modified lockdown, and its impact on economic and social realities has widened the scourge of child and early forced marriages (CEFM). With the digital revolution we have been experiencing for years now, we must remind us that technology is a tool that one must use effectively, while being a true asset for the world we want to have for our girls. Plan International reaffirmed that joint efforts are necessary to ending child marriage by 2030 during their webinar that took place on 25 May, on the occasion of the global lauch of their 2021 CEFM Flagship report, "Time to At – Let's Go Digital". GWI participated in this action-oriented dialogue alongside almost three hundred participants from different sectors and organizations from all over the world and top level global thematic leaders and speakers. Congress on Crime Prevention and Criminal Justice by Elisabeth Francis, GWI UN Rep, Vienna

The 14th UN Congress on Crime Prevention and Criminal Justice (postponed from 2020) took place in Kyoto 7-12 March 2021. The Congress, which has taken place every five years since 1955, represents the world's largest gathering of governments, international and regional organisations, civil society and academic experts focusing on crime prevention and criminal justice. It is a unique forum to exchange experience in research, law and policy development among countries, organisations and experts. Its conclusions - as per the Kyoto Declaration, adopted at the Congress by all member states - guide UN crime-related policies and actions for the next five-year period.

The Kyoto Congress was in hybrid format, with a limited in-person component and the majority of participants joining virtually. Of 5,600 participants, 4,200 were registered for online participation. This included representatives from 152 UN Member States, 37 intergovernmental organisations, 114 non-governmental organisations, 600 individual experts and a number of UN entities and institutes.
