Paraguay, Singapore and Sierra Leone's final outcomes at the 38th session UPR

The HRC's UPR is a unique process which involves a periodic review of the human rights records of all 193 United Nations Member States. The UPR, based on equal treatment for all countries, provides an opportunity for all States to declare what actions they have taken to improve the human rights situations in their countries and to overcome challenges to the enjoyment of human rights. From 3 to 14 May 2021, UPR held its 38th session, where three GWI National Federations and Associations (NFA) countries were under review: Paraguay, Sierra Leone and Singapore. Their final outcomes are as follows:

Paraguay was recommanded, inter alia, to accelerate its efforts in the inclusion of indigenuous, Afro-Paraguaya populations and children with disabilities in schools, but also to "Revoke Ministry of Education and Science resolution No. 29664, which prohibits public education materials on gender equality, reproductive rights, sexuality and non-discrimination, and establish gender-responsive comprehensive sexuality education in schools nationwide" as well as take further steps to protect women and girls from gender-based violence (GBV). Sierra Leone is encouraged to pursue its efforts to improve access to education for all girls, especially by ensuring the inclusion of pregnant girls. Moreover, it is recommended to pursue its effort in eliminating female genial mutilation and early and forced marriages. Singapore, for its part, was notably urged to include in its Constitution a definition of discrimination against women, and to pursue its efforts to combat GBV. In the field of education, it was recommended to continue strengthening access to quality and inclusive education. GWI invites you to click on each country name to access their latest UPR outcomes.

HLPF side-event on the need to make SDG data more accessible for youth

The meeting of the HLPF was held from Tuesday, 6 July, to Thursday, 15 July 2021. One of the side events on 9 July 2021 was presented by the Office of the UN Secretary-General's Envoy on Youth, Jayathma Wickramanayake, with the aim to highlight the importance of making access to all SDG inclusive for youth. Interestingly, the Youth SDG Dashboard was introduced during this event, which is a platform designed for youth that will enable them to go further into all 17 SDGs and their indicators. GWI shares the outcomes of this meeting and further emphasises that without young people's inclusion in the 2030 Agenda, we won't build a sustainable and equitable world for our future generations. WHD celebration at the UN Geneva

Outside the renowned Human Rights and Alliance of Civilizations Room of the UN buildings, GWI, represented by its intern Nell Yacef, gathered with about 100 people this year to celebrate WHD. In 2009, this day was proclaimed as such in memory of the 19 August 2003 bomb attack on the Canal Hotel in Baghdad, Iraq, killing 22 people. "During the ceremony, Ms. Tatiana Valovaya, Director-General, UN Office at Geneva, and Ms. Michelle Bachelet, UN High Commissioner for Human Rights, as well as the other speakers, recalled this painful day but also both the necessary and harsh reality of humanitarian work today", notes Nell. While we are witnessing an increasing need for humanitarian aid, this year's theme focuses on the immediate consequences of the climate emergency for the world's most vulnerable people. Therefore, GWI joins the #HumanRace and calls for world leaders to take meaningful climate action for the world's most affected people, including women and girls.

The other project is being held between the Canadian Federation of University Women and Graduate Women Netherlands with the focus on Afghan peace negotiations.
