## 786 million

people worldwide don't have access to safe water



Over 1.7 billion people are currently **living in river basins** where water use exceeds recharge.



Water, sanitation, and hygiene has the potential to prevent at least 9% of the global disease burden and 6% of global deaths.

Since 1900, 64% of **natural wetlands** on the planet has been lost.



80 % of women and girls are responsible for **water collection** without access to water on premises.


### **TIME FOR ACTION!**

Access to safe drinking water and practice lifesaving sanitation and hygiene habits in their homes, more women and girls are able to go to school

Convenient access to water and sanitation facilities increase privacy and reduce risk to women and girls of sexual harassment/assault while gathering water


Taking into account the **gendered dimensions and ddressing gender and water inequities** holds the potential to alleviate disease burden and have a significant impact on achieving the SDGs.
