GWI marks three Days of Observance

In the past few weeks, the world witnessed three important Days of Observance, World Day Against Child Labour on 12 June, International Day for the Elimination of Sexual Violence in Conflict on 19 June and World Refugee Day on 20 June. While the days have passed, it is important to continue to raise awareness about the critical barriers to girls' education throughout the year. It should be remembered, for example, that today 1 out of every 10 children are involved in child labour. Furthermore, an estimated 1 in 3 children in child labour are out of school. Children are especially vulnerable to injuries in their early developmental years and around 22,000 child laborers are killed at work each year. Specially to mark World Day Against Child Labour, GWI issued a press release on the importance of social protection systems to prevent child labour. **GWI invites you to access the press release** HERE.

Likewise, societies must remember the struggles of women and girls in conflict zones that extend beyond International Day for the Elimination of Sexual Violence in Conflict. This includes the fact that currently there are 39 million girls around the world that are out of school because of conflict. On top of these numbers, 97% of survivors reporting conflict-related sexual violence since 2021 are women and girls.

The world must also remember that beyond World Refugee Day, there remain 79.5 million people who have been displaced, half of which are women and girls. Moreover, only about 25% of refugee girls attend secondary school. So, as time moves on and the recent Days of Observance become more distant, it is important to remember that these issues are more than just titles for significant days of the year, they are factual issues that real women and girls are facing around the globe.
