GWI aligns with UNESCO to mark International Literacy Day with infographic In 1966, UNESCO declared 8 September, International Literacy Day (ILD) as an annual, global celebration to remind the public of the importance of literacy for a sustainable society. Despite progress made, literacy challenges persist with some 796 million illiterate people around the world, two-thirds being women, who still lack basic reading and writing skills. As a result of the COVID-19 pandemic, nearly 24 million people will likely never return to formal education, 11 million of those people being girls and young women. ILD is an opportunity to rethink the fundamental importance of literacy learning spaces to build resilience and ensure quality, equitable, and inclusive education for all. On 8 September, GWI aligned with UNESCO to mark ILD day with an emphasis on the 2022 theme, "Transforming Literacy Learning Spaces". Click HERE to read and widely share the ILD infographic!

Dr. Meera Bondre, Convenor of the GWI Membership Committee and member of the Indian Federation of University Women's Association, alongside her daughter, Dr Kalyani Bondre, participated in the 13th Asia Pre-Conference was Adult Education in Changing Global Context: Innovative Theory and Practices Impacting Asians and Beyond which was a part of the 63rd Adult Education Research Conference (AERC) organized by the University of Oklahoma, from 9-11 June 2022. The theme for this year's Asian Pre-Conference was Adult Education in



Changing Global Context: Innovative Theory and Practices Impacting Asians and Beyond. This conference is organised every year and its purpose is to provide an opportunity for scholars from both Asian ancestries (East) and the rest of the world to enhance mutual learning through active exchanges, to discuss diverse academic perspectives, and to have a dialogue to share knowledge.

In the global context, knowledge production is an active process that involves interconnectedness. Dr. Bondre Meera presented a paper titled "Non-Formal Continuing Education for Women's Empowerment: Creating Sustainable Societies". This paper was very well received as it was based on her grassroots level work for the past 35 years, and some case studies were also included. Dr. Kalyani Bondre made a video presentation titled, "Indian Music Training for Children and Adults: An Innovative Approach". # Reducing indigenous peoples' inequalities is through State's provision of safe access to quality, cultural-based, language-appropriate education programmes

In the written statement submitted to the 51<sup>st</sup> session of the Human Right Council being held at the Palais des Nations in Geneva 12 September to 7 October, GWI recognises the United Nations Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples (UNDRIP), adopted 15 years ago by most States, as the most comprehensive international instrument on the rights of indigenous peoples. Considering the UNDRIP and that there are an estimated 476 million indigenous people spanning 90 countries and speaking an overwhelming majority of the worlds estimated 7,000 languages and representing 5,000 different cultures, GWI submits this written statement as a respectful and urgent call for States to renew and rebuild their commitment to the UNDRIP that obliges them to take effective measures and, where appropriate, special measures to ensure continuing improvement of their economic and social conditions, including education. GWI, a global network of advocates for women and girls' education rights for 103 years, is primarily aligned with the right to safe access to child-centered, holistic, culture-appropriate, digitally accessible education programmes that improve future economic and social conditions. #### Volker Türk appointed new United Nations (UN) High Commissioner for Human Rights

On 8 September 2022, UN Secretary-General António Guterres appointed Volker Türk of Austria as the next United Nations High Commissioner for Human Rights, following approval by the General Assembly. "Mr. Türk has devoted his long and distinguished career to advancing universal human rights, notably the international protection of some of the world's most vulnerable people – refugees and Stateless persons", the UN chief said in a statement. The new High Commissioner is currently coordinating global policy work as an Under-

Secretary-General in the UN's Executive Office. He also ensures UN system-wide coordination in the follow-up to the Secretary-General's "Call to Action for Human Rights" and his report, Our Common Agenda, which sets out a vision to tackle the world's interconnected challenges on foundations of trust, solidarity and human rights. From 2019 to 2021, Mr. Türk served as Assistant Secretary-General for Strategic Coordination in the UN chief's Executive Office. Prior to that, he was the Assistant High Commissioner for Protection at UN refugees, UNHCR, in Geneva – from 2015 to 2019 – where he played a key role in the development of the landmark Global Compact on Refugees.


