SDG Action Weekend (ECOSOC NGOs and the Private Sector)

16-17 September 2023

The SDG Action Weekend was attended by Women Graduates-USA UN Representative Louise McLeod.

To maximize the SDG Summit's impact, the Secretary General convened an **SDG Action Weekend**, which generated opportunities for stakeholders, UN entities, and Member States to convene inside the United Nations Headquarters and set out specific commitments and contributions to drive SDG transformation between now and 2030.

The SDG Action Weekend consisted of the SDG Mobilization Day on Saturday, 16 September, and the SDG Acceleration Day on Sunday, 17 September at UNHQ in New York.

The SDG Mobilization Day (16 September) created an opportunity for stakeholders from all sectors to convene inside the United Nations Headquarters and mobilize towards an ambitious SDG Summit and UN General Assembly High-Level Week. Civil society, the private sector, youth, scientists, local and regional governments, and other stakeholders all have a key role in the implementation of the SDGs. Their participation, contributions and catalytic mobilization were essential to the success of the SDG Summit and its follow-up.

The SDG Acceleration Day (17 September) centered around the UN High-Impact Initiatives.

Assessing the Status of the SDGs at the 2023 half-way point to the 2030 Agenda deadline 8:

- We are at the intersection of a series of complex and intersecting crises that include the war in Ukraine, the effects of the Covid-19 pandemic and the impacts of climate change. The most vulnerable in our communities, including women and girls, young people, persons with disabilities, older persons and indigenous people have not been spared and are at the foremost receiving end of these crises despite commitments to eradicate poverty and to reduce hunger being at the core of this agenda
- 1.2 billion people were still living in multidimensional poverty as of 2022.
- approximately 8% of the global population or 680 million people will still be facing hunger in 2030
- only 15% of the targets are on track and many are going in reverse

- we are in danger of abandoning the SDGs altogether vs working together to accelerate their progress
 - The 2023 global Sustainable Development report outlines clear steps in that regard recommending an ambitious SDG push scenario to improve social protection, strengthen governance, promote a green economy and address digital disruption while improving access to quality education and healthcare in a human rights setting. It is still possible that by 2030 we could lift 124 million additional people out of poverty and ensure that someone 113 million fewer people are malnourished
- SDG stimulus requires at least 500 billion U.S. dollars a year as well as an effective debt relief mechanism that supports payment suspensions longer lending terms and lower rates
- **Countries already under debt distress** have been further crippled due to the economic and financial tolls of pandemic recovery on climate disasters
- The growing digital divide is intensifying
- **gender inequality** continues to undermine our progress.
- more than 800 million people around the world have been connected to electricity since 2015.
- 146 countries have already matched or on track to meeting the under five mortality target
- effective HIV treatment has halved global aids related deaths since 2010.

The SDGs are not just a list of goals - they carry the hopes dreams, rights and expectations of people everywhere and they provide the surest path to living up to our obligations and the Universal Declaration of Human Rights now in its 75th year – UN SG to the United Nations, Antonio Guterres

Global Actions Required to complete the 2030 Agenda and the SDGs⁹

- 1. Take action on **hunger**. Hunger is a shocking stain on humanity and is a epic human rights violation. Building on July's food system summit stocktaking, we are marshalling finance science data innovations and policy and governance support to our countries to transform food systems so all people can access healthy and nutritious diets.
- 2. Transition to **renewable energy**. We are putting forward *new energy compacts in which governments, businesses and global organizations joined forces to invest in decarbonizing energy systems and ensuring a just and equitable transition from fossil fuels to renewable energy.*
- 3. Benefits and opportunities of digitalization are not being spread widely enough to close the divide. We have launched an initiative to spur digital transformation across 100 countries supporting stronger technology capacities, better governance and innovative financing. Our proposed global digital compacts will also help countries build safe digital systems that provide Internet access for all including students in art to reach communities.

- 4. Too many children and young people are victims of **poor quality education or receive no education at all.** An emerging group of front runner countries is leading the way in boosting investment and transforming education systems around the world.
- 5. **Decent work and social protection**. Investments in social protection should be massively increased. Working with governments and the private sector, our global accelerator on jobs and social protection for just transitions, aims to create 400 million new decent jobs especially in the green care and digital economies and **extend social protection to over 4 billion people**.
- 6. End the triple planetary crisis of **climate change**, **pollution and biodiversity loss**. We're building a group of champion countries to explore how to reform economic policies and put nature and biodiversity at the heart of all decision making.
- **7.** Ensure full gender equality. It's long past the time to end discrimination to ensure a place at every table for women and girls and to end the scourge of gender based violence.

Realizing gender equality and the empowerment of all women and girls will make a crucial contribution to progress across all the goals and targets of the 2030 agenda. Women and girls must benefit from equal access to quality education, to economic resources and to political participation, as well as the same opportunities for employment leadership and decision making at all levels – President ECOSOC

The United Nations 2023 SDG Action Summit

18-19 September 2023

The SDGS at the Half-Way Point

The 2023 SDG Summit (Member States only) took place on 18-19 September 2023 in New York. It marked the beginning of a new phase of accelerated progress towards the Sustainable Development Goals with high-level political guidance on transformative and accelerated actions leading up to 2030.

Convened by the President of the General Assembly, the Summit marked the half-way point to the deadline set for achieving the 2030 Agenda and the Sustainable Development Goals. It was the centerpiece of the High-level Week of the General Assembly. It responded to the impact of multiple and interlocking crises facing the world and is expected to reignite a sense of hope, optimism, and enthusiasm for the 2030 Agenda.¹⁰

Outcome Document and Political Declaration

Member states approved the following Political Declaration submitted by the High Level Political Forum 2023 pledging to recommit to the completion of the Sustainable Development Goals.

The General Assembly in its resolution 70/299 decided that the High-level Political Forum on Sustainable Development (HLPF) shall have only one negotiated Political Declaration, covering the different and complementary functions of both sessions of the forum under the auspices of the General Assembly - the Summit, and the forum under the auspices of the Economic and Social Council (ECOSOC) when the forum is convened twice in the same year.

Executive Summary Report on the 2023 United Nations Sustainable Development Goals (SDG) Summit

September 18-19, 2023

The 2023 United Nations Sustainable Development Goals (SDG) Summit, held virtually on September 18-19, 2023, brought together world leaders, policymakers, experts, and stakeholders from around the globe to assess the progress made in the pursuit of the 17 SDGs. This report provides an overview of the key themes, discussions, and outcomes of the summit, highlighting achievements, challenges, and the way forward in advancing the global sustainable development agenda.
