GWI celebrates Black History Month

While Black History Month has its roots in the United States, it is celebrated each October in various forms in many other countries. Black History Month is a vital and timely observance for GWI to acknowledge the achievements and contributions of Black individuals throughout history. Presently, GWI honours Patrice Wellesley-Cole, GWI's first Black president. Wellesley-Cole is British born, originally Sierra Leonean. She practised in Freetown, Sierra Leone as a lawyer in the 1980s. In 1989 she was elected the first GWI, then Federation of University Women, Vice President of African origin. This accolade led to her being made an Honorary Fellow of St. Hugh's College, Oxford, her Alma mater on the recommendation of Principal, Dame Elish Angiolini. She strongly believes that "highlighting black culture and history in education improves diversity and understanding between nations and helps to eradicate ignorance and discrimination".

Throughout her life, Maya Angelou never ceased to defend the place of women and black people in American society

Mary Jane Patterson

Educator Mary Jane Patterson is considered to be the first African American woman to receive a Bachelor of Arts (B.A.) when she graduated from Oberlin College in 1862. Although Patterson's early years are unclear, it is believed that she was born in Raleigh, North Carolina in 1840. As a young girl, she arrived in Oberlin, Ohio with her family during the mid-1850s. In 1857 she completed a year of preparatory coursework at Oberlin College. Rather than transitioning into Oberlin's two-year program for women, she enrolled in the school's "gentlemen's course," a four-year programme of classical studies that led to a B.A. with high honours in 1862. Patterson pursued a career as an educator and also got involved in women's rights, helping to found the Colored Women's League of Washington, D.C. She died at the age of 54 on 24 September 1894.
